

Update on Noxious Weed and **Knotweed Classes in King County**

King County is pleased to announce that in addition to our regular noxious weed seminars announced in our March newsletter, we are also offering knotweed biology and control workshop for agency and crew staff this year. There will be sessions following each of the May noxious weed seminars, but we ask that people register for the knotweed class separately if planning on attending both. The knotweed seminar will qualify participants to borrow our knotweed stem injectors. This is our professional knotweed workshop. We will also be holding evening homeowner knotweed classes in June and July that will also qualify people to borrow our injectors (dates for these classes will be announced in the next newsletter). Professional Noxious Weed **Recertification Seminars**

We are taking registrations for our annual noxious weed seminars for vegetation management personnel, landscapers, and others working on noxious weed control. Knotweed Biology and Control Workshop

This workshop will teach about invasive knotweed species including Japanese, Bohemian, Giant and Himalayan Knotweed Topics to be covered in the first part include identification, biology, reproduction, distribution and impacts. The second part of the workshop will cover control methods that are effective (and some not so effective) in controlling the different species of knotweed, including manual, mechanical, cultural, biological and chemical control. Included in the chemical control section, we will give comprehensive instructions on the use and care of knotweed injection guns. Individuals completing this workshop will be eligible to borrow the weed program's knotweed injectors.

Note: This workshop is being held on the same days as our annual noxious weed control seminar described above. If you would like to attend both the seminar and the knotweed workshop, please register for each individually.

Spring Fertilizer Tips



This spring, keep your family, pets, neighbors and wildlife safe from harsh fertilizer chemicals.

Here are a few lawn fertilizer safety tips:

Read the instructions on the label every time you fertilize in order to understand your task and handle it properly.

Always use gloves when handling fertilizer. The nitrogen in the fertilizer can cause a chemical burn. If you get fertilizer on you, wash immediately under running water. If any redness or burning occurs, call your doctor.

Keep fertilizers far out of the reach of children and pets, in a cool, dry place. If you store fertilizer in a garage or shed, keep it on a high shelf, or in a locked container for chemical storage.

Apply only what you need. Lawn fertilizers can pollute local streams and Puget Sound. Take steps to keep others safe by telling your neighbors about the application, and be sure to keep children and pets off the grass until you have thoroughly watered the fertilizeror until a rainstorm has taken care of that job for you. Fertilize at the right time of the year: late spring or early fall on lawns. Landscape beds and trees do better with compost mulch instead of fertilizer. Compost releases nutrients slowly and there's no danger of "burning" your plants, and no polluted runoff.

Avoid "quick release" water soluble fertilizers - they look cheap but most is wasted through runoff. Instead, look for fertilizers labeled "slow-release" or "natural organic." They are slowly released by soil bacteria to feed your lawns and landscapes much longer, and there's much less runoff and pollution.

Dispose of unwanted fertilizers **properly** – There is no fee for hazardous waste disposal for Seattle residents. Visit SPU's web site or call 1-888-TOXIC ED (869-

Diversity Speaker Series 2012

Marc Elliot What Makes You Tic? Wednesday, April 18 Doors open / refreshments: 12:00pm Presentation: 12:30-2:00p North Seattle CC: Baxter Events Center

Expounding on his own disabilities and how people have reacted and treated him, Marc gives audiences insight into the power of tolerance in a fun and easily relatable manner. Tolerance is the speech's fountainhead as Marc provokes audiences to examine ways in which we make assumptions about others, leaving those that have seen his speech with an open mind about how to best deal with those that are different.

Two days after Marc Elliot was born, he was diagnosed with a rare birth defect called Hirschsprung's disease. Hirschsprung's had given him almost no working intestines and no ability to digest food on his own. However, Marc's challenges did not end after he left the hospital. At the age of nine, he was diagnosed with Tourette syndrome, a neurological disorder that causes him to make involuntary motor and vocal tics. As Marc grew older, his tics manifested in many different ways, from "ticcing" inappropriate words to blurting out random noises, including barking like a dog and chomping his teeth. Over the next 10 years, Marc struggled to live a normal life in the suburbs of St. Louis. Marc attended Washington University in St. Louis. Marc has spoken to hundreds of groups and organizations, reaching out to more than 100,000 individuals in the United States and

internationally. At the age of 26, Marc has now found a way to use his own story, his triumph over handicaps, as a way of helping individuals around the world find their own path to tolerance—for themselves and others.

Marcelo Bonta Diversifying the Environmental Movement: Preparing for 2019

Marcelo Bonta is the founder and executive director of the Center for Diversity and the Environment (CDE), an organization devoted to racially and ethnically diversifying the U.S. environmental movement, and the founder of the Environmental Professionals of Color, a growing network of over 300 leaders of color across the United States. The CDE provides opportunities for positive change in diversity, equity, inclusion on the individual, organizational, and movement levels. They have conducted a scoping project in Seattle recently—interviewing mainstream environmental, environmental justice, and social justice leaders to find out if these segments were ready to work more closely together and to do better on diversity, equity, and inclusion. They will also be starting an Environmental Professionals of Color chapter in Seattle in 2012.

Marcelo Bonta's work has been featured in numerous publications, including The New York Times, Grist Magazine, Saving Land Magazine, High

Country News, Sustainlane.com's "Sustainable City Rankings," Colors NW Magazine, The Oregonian, Diverse: Issues in Higher Education Magazine, Sustainable Industries Magazine, and Homes+Gardens Northwest magazine. He serves on the Diverse Partners for Environmental Progress National Council, Orion Grassroots Network Advisory Board, Saving Land Magazine Editorial Board, Columbia Land Trust Board of Trustees, and the Verde Advisory Council. He is a published author that has worked on biodiversity conservation, land use, and policy issues for numerous organizations, including Defenders of Wildlife, the National Park Service, and Massachusetts Audubon Society.
